Dear Parents,

During this term your child will be studying the following theme: <u>India</u> The following will be taught outside the theme:

English

We will learn to:

- > Read high frequency tricky words and apply phonic knowledge when reading new words.
- Re-read books to build fluency and confidence and express an opinion about what they have read.
- ▶ Use the Think, Say, Write and Check approach when writing sentences.
- ➢ Write a sequence of sentences and include basic verbs and adjectives for size and colour.
- ▶ Use full stops and capital letters in the correct place and leave spaces between words.
- ➢ Join words with 'and' within sentences.
- Segment words into individual sounds to aid with spelling.
- Spell words containing adjacent consonants e.g. bl, cr, st, tr.
- ▶ Name the letters of the alphabet in order and use these letter names when spelling words aloud.
- Form 'long ladder' lower case letters correctly e.g. i,j,l,t,u,v,w and 'one-armed robot' letters e.g. b,h,k,m,n,p,r.

Maths

We will learn to:

- > Count up to 30 objects, matching number to object, and count on and back from these numbers.
- Recognise dice arrays without counting. Double numbers from 1 to 5.
- Find pairs of numbers for numbers from 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.
- > Recognise, name and describe 2D shapes and sort them using Venn and Carroll diagrams.
- > Understand and then make teen numbers, and compare and order numbers to 20.
- ▶ Use addition facts for 5, 6 and 10 to solve subtractions.
- ▶ Use number facts for 5, 6 and 10 to solve word problems.
- Begin to add 3 small numbers by spotting bonds to 10 or doubles.
- > Describe position and direction using common words, and compare lengths and heights.
- > Recognise coins and know values up to £2.00 and begin to make different amounts in pence.

Science

Pupils will use the following practical scientific methods throughout each unit of study:

- Asking simple questions and recognising that they can be answered in different ways.
- Observing closely, using simple equipment.
- Performing simple tests.
- Identifying and classifying.
- ▶ Using their observations and ideas to suggest answers to questions.
- Gathering and recording data to help in answering questions.

If you would like to help your child in their study, you could undertake the following activities:

- Make sure your child reads every day
- Complete homework every week
- > Research and find information about India.
