Events

We are planning to visit the Anglo-Saxon village recreation and museum in West Stow, Suffolk to support our history and geography learning.

Science

In Science, we will be learning about Animals including humans.

This unit focuses on the digestive system in humans and animals and the functions of teeth. Children will learn more about herbivores. carnivores and omnivores in the context of teeth, digestion and the food chain. In addition, they will extend their understanding of food chains to more complex chains and food webs.

In addition to athletics, we will be learning Tennis skills during Summer 1 and rounders techniques and rules in Summer 2.

Topics in math for this term

Statistics: charts and line graphs

Decimals: comparing, ordering and rounding

Graphics

Maths

Import a photograph and explore the effects which can be created. Use a range of visual effects such as filters, hues and painting over photographs.

History

Geography

We will be developing our knowledge and understanding of the Anglo - Saxon and Viking periods in history by researching and basing creative tasks on the following historic events:

Identify geographical regions and their identifying human and physical characteristics.

Identify examples of human geography, including: types of settlement and land use, economic

Use the 8 points of a compass, 4 figure grid references, symbols and key (including the use of

Ordnance Survey maps) to build knowledge of the United Kingdom and the wider world.

activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including food and water.

Use maps, atlases, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features

- Roman withdrawal from Britain in AD 410 and the fall of the western Roman Empire.
- Scots invasions from Ireland to north Britain (now Scotland).
- Anglo-Saxon invasions, settlements and kingdoms: place names and village life.

As part of our Anglo - Saxon topic. we will develop our geographical skills by learning to:

Name and locate counties and cities of the United Kingdom,

- Anglo-Saxon art and culture, laws and justice.
- Viking raids and invasion.
- Resistance by Alfred the Great and Athelstan, first king of England.
- Edward the Confessor and his death in 1066.

PSHCE

We will be continuing through the Zone of Regulation programme. We will be exploring a range of tools and strategies for self regulation; to sustain, calm and alert. These tools and strategies fall into three strategies: sensory, thinking and calming. We will be teaching the children to scale problems and be flexible in their thinking about an incident. In conjunction with the Zones of Regulation lessons, children will be problem solving around common playground glitches.
