Year 2 Class Comer

WOW, what an amazing first half of the spring term Year 2 have had. This week, we have continued to show how amazing by picking up where we left off.

Working hand in Maths lessons has enabled us to secure our knowledge of our 2-, 5- and 10-times table before being able to divide. In DT, we made fire engines with the link to our Topic of The Great Fire of London. We learnt that in order for a car to move, it must have wheels and axels. Using this, we set out on a mission to make our own moving fire engine. We used cardboard to create the body of our fire engine before fixing wheel and axels to this to make it move. When we were confident it would move, we painted and decorated it, to look like a fire engine.

In our topic work, we continued to learn all about The Great Fire of London. We have learnt that it started in Thomas Farriner's bakery. Our next step is to look at a map to understand the true extent of this great fire. We will label a map showing how far the fire spread across the 5 days.

In Geography, we have been learning about The United Kingdom. We looked closely at the different countries' flags and flowers before creating a fact file of these. We now know that England, Scotland and Wales make up Great Britain whereas Northern Ireland is part of The United Kingdom.

We have been super spellers this week! We have learnt about contracting words to make them smaller. We have all been able to use apostrophes to show where there are missing words. We have learnt words like didn't, shouldn't and I'll. Our next task is to use this within our story writing this term. Year 2 have been on fire this week with their learning! 

Thank you for your support in making this a fantastic celebration of reading. We look forward to seeing all the wonderful book characters on World Book Day!



What can you do to keep your child safe online.

- Talk to your child about what they're up to online. Be a part of their online life; involve the whole family and show an interest. Find out what sites they visit and what they love about them, if they know you understand they are more likely to come to you if they have any problems.
- Visit the website where you will find advice and a range of online safety guides for parents
- Set up your own family agreement for using the internet. There are loads of templates online that you can use to help you.
- Use parental controls on all devices that link to the internet, such as the TV, laptops, computers, games consoles and mobile phones.
- Keep all equipment that connects to the internet in a family space. For children of this age, it is important to keep internet use in family areas so you can see the sites your child is using and be there for them if they stumble across something they don't want to see.
- Know what connects to the internet and how. Make sure you're aware of which devices that your child uses connect to the internet, such as their phone or games console. Also, find out how they are accessing the internet is it your connection, or a neighbour's Wi-Fi? This will affect whether the safety setting you set are being applied.
- Go through the SMART internet rules with your child:



Be smart &

Keep safe by being careful not to give out personal information – such as your full name, email address, phone number, home address, photos or school name – to people you are chatting with online.

Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present.
